Their creator was a Queen Anne student and most of them were drawn for the Grizzly Annual by Larry Holcomb during his senior year.

John Laurence Holcomb graduated in the class of 1953 and was known to many of his classmates as Larry. His mother and father both graduated from Queen Anne in 1921 and his older brother, Clyde, was in the class of 1945.

Larry joined the Naval Reserve at age 17 and attended boot camp in San Diego in the summer of 1952, and then Reserve activities at the Lake Union Reserve Center afterward. He attended the U of W after high school for a year and a half and was a member of Delta Upsilon fraternity. He could be seen in his green Model A Ford coupe, often with his Irish Setter, Pat, in the passenger seat. While attending some special classes at Everett Junior College he became ill.

Kidney failure confined Larry to bed for a year and a half before he recovered enough to get a job with a customs brokerage firm. A subsequent relapse limited his activity to classes two hours a day at Seattle Pacific College in an attempt to continue his education. He again recovered enough to accept a new job offer at a larger customs bro-

kerage. Enthusiasm over this new opportunity was dashed by his father's sudden death in June of 1957.

Five Grizzlies Make UW Top 100

As the 20th Century reaches its end, many lists have appeared of the top events, top people, etc. of the last 100 years. Recently, the University of Washington Alumni Association compiled its list of the 100 UW Alumni of the Century. Included in that list are five Queen Anne grads. Holding five percent of the UW list is a considerable achievement, considering from how many schools and states the UW student body has been drawn over the century. The list appears in the December, 1999 *Columns* magazine. For old timers, this is not the campus humor magazine of yesteryear, but the alumni magazine of today. The five chosen were:

John Cherberg, '29. Cherberg played football at Queen Anne and the UW, before going on to a coaching career at Cleveland High School, Queen Anne high school and the University of Washington, where he was initially Freshman football coach and then head coach. He followed his athletic career by being elected Lt. Governor of our state in 1956, where he served 32 years.

Longer than any other Lt. Governor in US history. He died in 1992.

Hank Ketcham, '37. Ketcham attended UW art school in the 1940s. He created Dennis the Menace in 1950 and is still drawing it today. It appears in newspapers in 48 countries and 19 languages.

Joel Pritchard, '44. Pritchard spent 12 years in the Washington Legislature, 12 years in Congress and 9 years as Washington's Lt. Governor, succeeding Cherberg. A Republican, he was known for his civility and his ability to build bipartisan coalitions. He died in 1997.

Bob Houbregs, '49. Houbregs played baseball and basketball at Queen Anne. He led the Husky men's basketball team to their only NCAA Final Four appearance, in 1953. Along the way he made All American three times, set numerous UW basketball records, played five years in the NBA, and was the SuperSonics general manager from 1970-1973.

Gary Kildall, '60. Kildall, a pioneer in the computer software industry, developed the CP/M operating system that made the personal computer possible. He founded Digital Research in 1976, and sold it to Novell in 1991. He died in 1994.
