Remembering Coach Normile

Coach Ray Normile, one of Queen Anne's most memorable figures, passed away last summer in Seattle at age 88, following a year of heart problems.

Ray Davis Normile was born in Purcell, Kansas. His family moved to Aberdeen, Washington where he attended Weatherwax High School and participated in all sports. He attended Grays Harbor Community College and then Central Washington College, lettering in football and basketball.

He married Lorene Belair in 1938. She preceded him in death in 1999, after 61 years of marriage.

His 39 year career in teaching, coaching and administration included stops in many parts of the country but it was Seattle, where he stayed 21 years at Queen Anne from 1945 to 1966. There he coached football, basketball, baseball and track. In the classroom, many young men learned Boys Health or Washington State History under "Coach" Normile. During those years Queen Anne finished in the upper division 12 times and earned its only state tournament berth in 1965.

Bill Knight, '48, retired P-I sports editor and Queen Anne basketball player, noted that Normile, "was tough and on the mark. He was proud of what people did with their lives and remembered stories about everyone." Marv Harshman, former UW head basketball coach, met Ray while they were both at Kennewick. He noted that, "Ray never met a story he didn't like". Ray's grandson, Scott, observed that his grandfather knew someone everywhere he went. As with many coaches, Normile's sayings live on in his players memories: "It takes a cool head to win a hot ball game".

Ray was a lifetime member of the Washington State Coaches Association and was proud to be inducted into the state coaching Hall of Fame in 1993.

Scholarships

Eligible applicants include all Queen Anne graduates and descendants of Queen Anne alumni, including step-children and adopted children. Grizzly "orphans," students who attended Queen Anne in 1981 but finished elsewhere due to the school's closure, are also eligible.

Applicants must return a completed application form, a brief financial statement, transcripts, a personal letter outlining their goals and achievements and two letters of recommendation, one of which must be from their high school or college teacher or counselor. Instructions are included with the application packet.

The scholarship winners will be selected by early May and their awards will be presented at their school's honors program or commencement ceremony.

The Alumni Scholarship Program has been the primary public expression of our Association's legacy since it was founded in 1981. The scholarship funds arise directly from the giving of our Grizzly grads, either individually or through their reunions. All gifts are tax deductible. Gifts specified for scholarships are used either for direct scholarships or for growth of our scholarship endowment fund to provide a perpetual program of Grizzly scholarships.

As we looked at the original Queen Anne High School commencement program and the listing of 379 students graduating on June 10, 1936, we were thoughtful about what had transpired since that day.

“It was worth all the work. We all had a great time,” said John Hennes, who with Carol Batchelder chaired the Queen Anne Class of 1951 reunion June 22-23.

They indeed had a great time with 116 class members attending at least one of the events. On Friday night a no-host get together at Jillian's on Lake Union was a non-stop “remember-when” session with class members sneaking peeks at the name tags made by JoEllen (McComb) Vinyard, with annual pictures on them.

Saturday morning, many of the class toured the old building marveling and lamenting the changes.

Saturday evening was the main event at the College Club downtown. Picture boards displayed photos from grade school on. Other display boards brought back memories of dances and Kapers performances. You name it. If we saved it, it was there. The reunion was held with the support of Reunions with Class.

The Seattle School Archives provided the old stuffed Grizzly head, cheer megaphone, commencement program, trophies and other items from our past.

So many grads were there that the group photo had to be in two groups.

Instead of a sit-down dinner, the committee had elected to serve “hearty hors d'oeuvres” with a buffet of hot and cold items available most of the evening. Classmates grabbed a plateful and sat down with one group and then circulated to another group.

“We felt that this idea gave people a chance to visit with more than just the people they happened to be seated near at a dinner,” said John.

Only Louisa Boren's name was on the original list; that only because she was an unmarried adult woman. She later married David Denny and lived on and below Queen Anne Hill during her years here.

Perhaps some of you will recall the excellent front page series of the Seattle Shopping News. "Highlights in the Story of Seattle." This series ran for nearly three years. There were keepsakes then, and there are keepsakes now - pamphlets, booklets, and books covering many aspects of the growth and development of this city.

For the Book Club of Washington, I put together a list of the "Seattle 150." This is a bibliographical checklist of the 150 books which, in my estimation, are most significant in assisting the new Seattleite, as well as the old, to understand truly how we got to be the way we are. I started with 900 titles, but trimmed that down to 225. It was the most difficult thing for me to cut away the excess of 75, but I did it, and the result will be published in the Book Club's next Journal.

That's your history lesson for this time.

Center School Now Open

The first high school in the Queen Anne/Magnolia area since 1981 opened its doors on Sept. 5, 2001. The Center School, a small arts-oriented Seattle public high school, began classes with 150 students and 10 faculty.

The new school was formed, partly, in response to complaints from Queen Anne and Magnolia parents that their children had no local school and no priority to get into any other school. The new school will grow to about 300 over the next two years, from freshmen to seniors.

The permanent home for the Center School will be the 3rd and 4th floors of the Center House on the Seattle Center's grounds. For this year, the school is housed in the former Sacred Heart School on John Street, across from the Science Center. A reported \$3.6 million upgrade to the Center House is underway. The current location was, most recently, the former home of the Lifetime Learning Center.

The new school was developed to provide an arts and science program, in cooperation with the many arts programs at the Seattle Center and the Pacific Science Center.

Queen Anne closed its doors in 1981. The new students at the new school will be choosing school colors and a mascot later this year.

Do You Remember The Name?

During the 1946-47 school year our PE. teacher, Erwin Henkel, predicted over and over, "Kid, four years from now nobody will ever remember your name."

He was talking to Queen Anne's All-City end, the back bone of the basketball team, the baseball team's first baseman. This guy had all kinds of talents. He played the piano by ear. He was one of the best at table tennis down at the Queen Anne YMCA. He was so skilled on the pinball machine that Al Gordon of Al's Hamburger Shop dreaded to see him come through the door. Al would often throw his towel on his pin ball machine and announce that the machine was broken.

Henk was wrong! We do remember him! Each of us have our own favorite memories. How could we forget?

Halfback, Lowell Knutson, probably remembers him as being his favorite target. The receiver who caught every thing Lowell threw his way. Some of the basketball fans will remember how when he made a shot classmates in the stands would chant, "ding, ding, ding". If he missed a shot they would be calling out, "tilt". Or maybe some will remember him as the guy who had developed calluses in the palms of his hands from keeping that silver ball alive in the pinball game. Personally, I always remember him for his place kicking record. His record was terrible!

The 1946 Queen Anne football team amassed an amazing record. Going into the final game of the season the opposition had managed to score only once. Through 6 games, nine Kuay touchdowns were followed by only one point-after. That lone point-after was achieved by running the ball into the end zone on a trick play. Our place kicker was not creating a great record.

The Grizzlies' season finale matched them against Lincoln High School. The Lincoln Lynx had been

capturing all the headlines with a high scoring offense. Queen Anne carried the underdog label. Any hope of a league championship depended upon the unlikelihood of Grizzlies upsetting the highly touted Lincoln team. The game drew a sell-out crowd at the tiny West Seattle Stadium.

To the amazement of all, the Kuay eleven scored in the first minutes of the game. Once again the try-for-point was missed. Lincoln tallied the next score on a long pass but missed the point-after. The halftime score stood at 6 to 6. On another long pass the Lincoln Red and Black gained the lead. The pressure of the moment caused their place kicker to have his problems and his kick went wide. The 12 to 6 score held through the remainder of the game until Queen Anne's Bill Storie broke loose for a 48 yard gain to the Lincoln 26 yard line. Three running plays could only move the ball 5 yards. The next play would be Queen Anne's final play unless they made a first down.

Back into the game came the Kuay's All-City receiver. (He had been out of the game due to a painful elbow injury). Everybody in the stadium knew the next play would be a pass. Queen Anne fans were asking each other, "Could he add just one more reception to his season record?" The only two Kuay passes thrown that day had fallen to the turf incomplete.

Everybody was on their feet to watch. Cheerleaders on both sides of the field had put down their megaphones. Players were up off the bench and crowding the sidelines. The ball was centered to tailback, Don Doran, who ran to his right, stopped and lofted a pass down field. The pass didn't go to the league's number one receiver. Instead a perfect strike was thrown back across the field to the other end. Don Doran was the only person in the entire stadium who had his eyes on that receiver. The All-city end had drawn all of the defenders off to one side of the field and left

Herb Shin all alone. He caught the pass and walked untouched across the goal line.

The score was now tied at 12 to 12 with only a little time left in the game. A tie was the same as a loss for Queen Anne's quest for the championship. A win was required. What would Queen Anne do? Remember, their only successful try-for-point came on a trick play. Lincoln had seen that one and would not let that happen to them again. The team lined up for a kick. Fans were reminding each other that our kicker hadn't kicked a point-after touchdown all season. His record was 9 tries without one success. But there he was with a possible championship hanging on the outcome of this effort. One sports writer later described him as being "cool as an Eskimo picnic". At that moment there wasn't one other person in the entire stadium who would fit that description.

I do remember him, Henk. Even after all these years I remember that name. His place kicking record ended at 10 tries and only one successful effort. But, what a success that was! Queen Anne won the game 13 to 12.



I Remember

I remember when both Queen Anne and Roosevelt pitchers threw no-hitters, in the same game, and Queen Anne still lost! It happened in May of 1944 and Jack Ferluga, '44, was our pitcher. A Roosevelt runner got on first base through a fielding error and then our first baseman dropped a pop-up fly ball, letting the Roosevelt runner score. The Teddies won 1-0, but the paper the next day showed the pitchers for both teams had no-hitters. The Seattle Times called it "the dizziest day in the history of the Seattle High School Baseball League."

Tribute to a teacher

I have been receiving copies of The Kuay newsletter for quite some time and keep promising myself that I would write in and say thank you. Now, I'm finally finding the time to do just that.

First, thanks to all of the alumni volunteers who have so devotedly kept the QA spirit alive all of these years. It warms my heart to know that, although the building may now be apartments--the memories of thousands of former students remember what it really always will be-- a terrific high school. Many, many thanks.

Second, I enjoy reading all of the alum updates, events, and historical articles in The Kuay. Let me give you a brief update on myself (you need not publish this, I'm providing the information just to let you know I want to continue receiving the newsletter and information about Queen Anne).

My name is Dawn Upchurch (same as in high school), and I graduated in the class of 1975, a peak baby boom year! I think there was close to 500 in my graduating class. After graduating from Queen Anne, I got my BS from Stanford. After Stanford, I worked for a few years and then returned to graduate school, this time Johns Hopkins, and got a Ph.D. in demography and public health. Since 1991 I have been on the faculty at UCLA, where I am professor of public health. I live in Venice, CA with my husband and our two cats.

The third reason I am writing is because I saw on page 12 of the August, 2001 issue that Mrs. Kroft, teacher from 1955-1981, passed away this past March. **I am deeply saddened by this, in part, because I never thanked Mrs. Kroft for all that she did for me. She changed my life in such a fundamental way, that I would simply not be the person I am today if it were not for her.**

As the oldest daughter of five children being raised by a single mom, "big name" colleges were out of the question. I had fully intended to go to the UW (and had a full scholarship to do so). But it was Mrs. Kroft who urged me to reach for my dreams. When I was her student,

her son was attending Stanford as a graduate student. I remember her bringing in a copy of the Stanford Daily for me to look at, all the while reinforcing to me what a terrific place it was and that I should think about going there. Then, early on in my Senior year, a Stanford recruiter came to Queen Anne. I remember Mrs. Kroft grabbing me by the hand and grabbing the recruiter by the hand and dragging us both into the hallway. She said, "This girl is Stanford material. You have to admit her." I was stunned and overwhelmed. At her encouragement, I actually applied to Stanford, all the while thinking to myself, "well, even if I do get in, we can't afford it." When that fateful "fat" envelope came from Stanford that following spring, I was beside myself I knew what it meant! And what did I do? Did I call my mother and tell her? Did I call my best friend or boy friend? No, I called Queen Anne High School. I called the office and I made them drag Mrs. Kroft out of her 6th period class and told her the news! **We were both crying and laughing together over the phone. It was a life changing moment, with a touch of the miraculous thrown in.**

Her encouragement and faith in me gave me the courage to entertain ideas, worlds, and opportunities I had never considered for myself. She was a remarkable woman and a remarkable teacher who opened up a whole new world for this student. **Go in peace, Mrs. Kroft, and know that your spirit lives in the hundreds of lives you've changed. Like mine.**


